## BOUNTY

AT THE WORLD'S FAIR MARINA



THIS is your opportunity to walk the decks of a sailing ship out of the past! Go aboard The Bounty and you are on the decks of the historic vessel that has seen violence and mutiny, inspired legends and novels and movies.

The Smith and Rhuland shipyard in Nova Scotia was selected to recreate The Bounty because of the skill of its veteran craftsmen. An amazing replica, the plans were the original blueprints now in the British Museum.



Many of those who worked on recreating The Bounty had helped to build some of the world's most famous sailing vessels. The Bounty is a faithful copy of the original, from rope davits to 10,000 square feet of canvas on the square-rigged masts.

The Bounty is 118 feet in length, her beam is 30 feet, six inches, with a 14-foot draft. Her tonnage is 480 gross and 128 net.

More than 400,000 board feet of timber, mostly American Oak from New Jersey, was used in the planking.

The biggest timber used was in the main-mast, which is 27 inches in diameter and 65 feet long. Height

from the deck to the top of the mainmast is 103 feet.

Into the ship also went 12 tons of screw bolts, 14 tons of bar iron, 2½ tons of spikes, 1,200 pounds of putty, 1½ miles of wire rigging.

Upon completion, The Bounty made the 7,327-mile voyage from the shipyard to Tahiti (where the motion picture was being filmed) via the Panama Canal in 33 sailing days!

It took Captain Bligh more than a year to make the journey from England to Tahiti in 1787. Now see his famous command, the vessel that was such a storm-center, exactly as it appeared in those eventful times!
